- 6 atry was faith in matter. The schools have rendered faith in drugs the fashion, rather than faith in Deity. By trusting matter to destroy its own discord, health and
- 9 harmony have been sacrificed. Such systems are barren of the vitality of spiritual power, by which material sense is made the servant of Science and religion becomes
- 12 Christlike.

Divine Science derives its sanction from the Bible,

- 24 and the divine origin of Science is demonstrated through the holy influence of Truth in healing sickness and sin. This healing power of Truth
- must have been far anterior to the period in which Jesus lived. It is as ancient as "the Ancient of days." It lives through all Life, and extends throughout
 all space.

The struggle for the recovery of invalids goes on, not 9 between material methods, but between mortal minds Belief and firm trust

How healing was lost

Christian Science as old as God and immortal Mind. The victory will be on the patient's side only as immortal Mind
